

ALUMNI FRANCISCAN SISTERS

Sister Rosine (Diane) Sobczak
'60 has a master's degree
in biology and found a way to
combine her love for science with
her ministry. In 1989, she attended
a workshop given by Thomas Berry,
a cultural historian who stressed
human interdependence with
the Earth and a greater sense of
responsibility when it comes to the
ecological and social challenges of
our times. That experience led to
a realization for Sister Rosine that
God was calling her to work for the
environment.

She eventually determined that she should carry out her call by educating others about God at work in the universe and about our planet and the environment. As a Franciscan Sister, Sister Rosine founded the Life Lab at Lourdes University in 1990, and it operated until 2012. The program was focused on our ecosystem, teaching close to 6,000 students each year about animals, plants, and insects. The Life Lab also provided teacher education workshops and worked with the University of Toledo to

help students earn credits for their Masters in Education and Environmental Science degrees.

Also in 1990, Sister Rosine and others concerned about sustaining life on Earth founded the Science Alliance for Valuing the Environment (SAVE), an environmental nonprofit organization for ecology, spirituality, and sustainability. The organization addresses current local, national, and worldwide environmental issues through programs and lectures. SAVE also provides sponsor judges for the Northwest District Science Day and provides \$500 scholarships for high school seniors going to college.

Teaching others about our connection to nature and our responsibility to the environment is just another step in Sister Rosine's long teaching career, although that wasn't part of her original plan. When she began her studies at Mary Manse College in 1960, she was focused on medical technology. But she transitioned into education and then left for the Convent of the Sisters of St. Francis in Sylvania. Mother Justinian later asked her to try teaching, and she agreed.

Sister Rosine taught at St. Joseph Sylvania for one year, then left to teach in Detroit for a year, and



came back to Toledo and taught for five years at Regina Coeli and two years at Sts. Peter and Paul. She also finished her studies at Mary Manse, graduating in 1969. She went on to teach at Lourdes College/University for 45 years. She was an Associate Professor at Lourdes until 2019, including serving as Division Chair of Natural Math Science from 1983-92, as Biology Department Chair twice, and as the Life Lab Coordinator. She is now Associate Professor Emerita (retired) and still works as the SAVE Coordinator.

During her time as a student at Central Catholic, Sister Rosine was her class valedictorian, and she was also chosen for the honor of crowning the Blessed Mother during the May Crowning ceremony. She was in the Monogram Club, Chemistry and Math Clubs, Student Council, Young Christian Adults, the Student Spiritual Committee, the Junior Council on World Affairs, and the Spanish Club. Her experiences at Central Catholic helped shape her faith. "Four years of religious education and the presence of sisters and priests helped me keep focus on what was really important in life," she said.

She also took the yearly retreats very seriously.

Every year, Central Catholic sponsored a pilgrimage to Our Lady of Consolation Shrine in Carey, Ohio. One year when Sister Rosine made the pilgrimage, she asked Mary to guide her if she was supposed to be a sister. "I think she did!" she recalled. "CCHS had many orders of sisters teaching there. I visited each convent, and the Sylvania Franciscans were my choice because I had them going back to grade school. They made an impression on me... with their

joyful spirit, their hospitality, their spirituality, etc. I felt comfortable with them."

Sister Rosine celebrated her 50th anniversary of professed religious life in 2015. She credits the Franciscans for her interest in the universe and her desire to help people understand how we are all interconnected and that we need to work together for the sake of Mother Earth.

Sister M. Rita Jane Radecki '57 is celebrating her 60th Jubilee in 2022. She was drawn from an early age to become either a sister or an actress, and at CCHS, she had the lead in *Call Me Madam*. Sister Rita Jane made her first profession in 1962 and continued teaching grades 1-8. She also worked in religious education and became a certified chaplain. Rev. Gregory Hite

March 11, 1955 - October 28, 2021

Reverend Gregory R. Hite passed away on October 28, 2021, at the age of 66. He attended Gesu Elementary School and St. Francis DeSales High School (Class of 1973). He had a bachelor's degree in English and was a graduate of St. Gregory Seminary at Athenaeum of Ohio in Cincinnati. He

studied at the Pontifical University of St. Thomas Aquinas in Rome, from which he received a degree in sacred theology in 1980. He completed a licentiate in sacred theology from The Catholic University of America in Washington. In 1991, he received a master's degree in educational administration from the University of Dayton.

In 1981, he was ordained to the priesthood by Bishop James R. Hoffman and received his first assignment as Parochial Vicar at St. Mary's Parish in Sandusky, where he was also a full-time religion instructor, department chair, and chaplain to the high school (1981-86). From 1988-94, he was Parochial Vicar and high school principal at St. Wendelin parish in Fostoria. In 1994, he became pastor at St. Mary of the Snows Parish in Mansfield, where he also served as part-time chaplain at Mansfield Correctional Institution - a chaplaincy he continued until 1999.

From 1999-2004, Father Hite was President of Central Catholic High School. During his leadership, he developed the school's Millennium Fund, a campaign to grow the endowment funds in support of tuition assistance and faculty and staff support. His spiritual direction partly inspired three students to enter the seminary and go on to be ordained as priests in the Toledo Diocese - Rev. Anthony Coci '05 (ordained in 2017), Rev. Matthew Frisbee '05 (ordained in 2014), and Rev. Michael Roemmele '02 (ordained in 2011).

Fr. Hite went on to serve as pastor of St. Joan of Arc Parish from 2004-2011, and then became pastor of

St. Peter's Parish in Mansfield.
During his tenure, he served as local superintendent of the school system and as a member of the College of Consultors to Bishop Daniel E. Thomas.

Father Hite loved his priesthood and mentored several seminarians over the years. He was grateful for the opportunity to share his experiences of priesthood with them. He received senior status last July and was in residence at All Saints Parish in Rossford.

Rev. James E. Steinle

April 18, 1926 - May 23, 2020

Rev. James E. Steinle

passed away May 23, 2020 at the age of 94. He was born in Delphos, Ohio. Fr. Steinle entered seminary training for the priesthood at Saint Meinrad School of Theology in Indiana and St. Gregory Seminary in Cincinnati, and he graduated from Mount Saint Mary's Seminary in Cincinnati. He served the Toledo Diocese as an Assistant or Pastor at St. Rose of Lima, Perrysburg; St. Joseph, Tiffin; St. Joseph, Sylvania; St. Paul the Apostle, Norwalk, where he was also the Principal at St. Paul Central Catholic; St. Pius X, Sycamore; Most Pure Heart of Mary, Shelby; St. Stephen, Attica; St. Aloysius, Republic; St. Joseph, Galion; St. John the Baptist, Delphos; Our

Lady of Mercy, Fayette; Our Lady of Fatima, Lyons and St. Bernard, New Washington.

From 1968 to 1973, Fr. Steinle was principal at Central Catholic High School. Following in the giant footsteps of the beloved Monsignor John Harrington, who was principal at CCHS for 27 years, Fr. Steinle was faced with tuition increases, an aging building, and students who wanted immediate change. His competence, enthusiasm, and dedication led him through these turbulent years.

Fr. Steinle felt students should play a larger role in organizing the school. He instituted a Black Culture Week

and rejuvenated the music program. Athletic teams continued to win championships, with the girls' program coming on especially strong under the direction of Fran Krompak '58.

The Irish Knight spent time on Cherry Street, wrestling and baseball teams dominated their divisions, and the boys' basketball team earned the number one computer ranking in the state. Fr. Steinle appointed the first lay assistant principal, Richard Beres. Students and teachers worked together, and the family spirit was evident.

Central Catholic created the Reverend James E. Steinle Senior Leadership Award in honor of Fr. Steinle. He was a person who exhibited leadership



by example, as well as by words and programs, often without any formal recognition for himself. The award is given each year at the senior honors assembly and recognizes seniors who have demonstrated strong qualities of leadership and service, also without receiving formal recognition. 🔻



Rev. Martin Donnelly, Class of 1956

August 16, 1938 - January 27, 2019

Rev. P. Martin Donnelly '56
passed away January 27, 2019,
at the age of 80. He was a priest,
pastor, and principal in the
Catholic Diocese of Toledo. He
had a bachelor's degree from St.
Meinrad Seminary College and
a master's of education from the
University of Notre Dame. He
followed his brother into the
priesthood and was ordained in

1964. Early assignments were at


St. Paul Parish and High School in

Norwalk, Ohio, and Lima Central

Catholic High School.

His last assignment, from 2005-11, was as pastor of Most Blessed Sacrament Parish, of which his parents were founding members. He enjoyed walking in the neighborhood, where he grew up and continued to live in retirement. He spent more than a decade at Central Catholic High School, starting in 1973 as assistant principal, later as principal, and then as pastor and president from 1976-87.


Under Fr. Donnelly, Central



Catholic expanded its recruitment program and increased enrollment; updated the windows, heating, and ventilating systems; renovated the science labs; and continued moving into the technology age with the Catherine A. **Schubert Computer** room. Fr. Donnelly initiated the parish parent representative program at Central Catholic, began the Burger King tuition assistance program, and revamped the public relations, development,

and alumni office. When he was appointed pastor and president, Michael Smith became our first lay principal. Boys' and girls' soccer teams were added to the Irish athletic program, and the football team and girls' basketball team played in their state championships.

After his time at CCHS, Fr. Donnelly was named pastor of two central Toledo parishes, St. Ann and St. Teresa. He oversaw the joining of the congregations - along with St. Benedict the Moor - to create St. Martin de Porres Parish, in the cathedral-style building created for St. Ann. He loved the multicultural diversity of this new parish. He had also led the



Central City Ministries of Toledo, a coalition of urban parishes and schools.

do at Central Catholic. Nowhere is this more evident than in the academic curriculum of the theology department. Theology is the mother of all disciplines and is, therefore, an integral component of the intellectual formation of all Central Catholic students. The theology curriculum at Central Catholic is an implementation of the Diocese of Toledo Course of Study for High School Theology based on the Doctrinal Elements of a Curriculum Framework developed by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops.

All Central Catholic students are required to take four years of theology. In Theology 1, students gain a general knowledge and appreciation of the Sacred Scriptures and are introduced to the mystery of Jesus Christ. For students who are not Catholic or have not had a Catholic education. Central Catholic offers the First Year Catholic Experience. This class covers the regular Theology 1 curriculum, after beginning with a brief introduction to Catholic beliefs, attitudes, and practices.

"Parents worry about their child taking a theology class with no prior background. Our goal was to set up all of our students for success in theology. It is taught by a faculty member who previously worked in youth ministry."

During their sophomore year, CCHS students explore the redemptive work of Jesus Christ and learn more about the Church and the seven Sacraments. Theology 3 covers moral concepts and precepts, including an extensive review of Pope John Paul II's teaching on Theology of the Body. Students also look at the vocations of married life, priestly life, and consecrated life, and how Christ calls us to live.

Theology 4 consists of Diocesan electives about Catholic social teaching with an emphasis on the care for the poor and vulnerable in society, and Ecumenism and Apologetics in which students explore how the Catholic Church relates to non-Catholic Christians as well as other religions of the world. Theology 2, 3, and 4 courses are also offered at the honors level, which requires a teacher recommendation based on a strong deeper into the material, and more is expected in their assessments.

Juniors and seniors have the opportunity to take two on-campus theology courses during the school day through Lourdes University. They are the honors-level classes, Adventures in Grace: Discovering the Christian Faith in the Literature of C.S. Lewis, Flannery O'Connor, and Fyodor Dostoevsky; and How Catholic Art Saved the Faith, which are currently being taught by Central Catholic's Priest Leader, Fr. David Kidd.

Our theology classes are academically rigorous, with a focus on critical thinking, writing, and understanding the tenets of our faith, while intentionally integrating personal spirituality through prayer, reflection, and time in our beautiful Christ the King Chapel each week. Theology teachers bring experience from master's degrees in campus ministry and the collegiate study of philosophy.

Students have opportunities to take field trips to enhance their classroom learning. Last November, the junior class went to the Ohio Theater to see a one-man play about the life and trials of Fr. Augustus Tolton, the first black American priest in the U.S. Every class experiences an off-campus retreat during the year, including the senior Kairos retreat, which is overnight over multiple days.

Every teacher starts class with prayer, and teachers in all subjects incorporate our Catholic identity and our faith into classes outside the theology department. "It's not unusual to hear our psychology teacher pondering the intricacies of God's creation in how He made the human brain, or for ecology class to discuss the social teaching of care for creation and the environment, or for the American Literature class to contemplate the motifs of religion in *The Grapes of* Wrath," said Morgan Delp, Dean of Academics. "Teachers of every content area also engage students in service in their classrooms, such as by writing letters to veterans in history class or participating in a food security simulation in biology class."

"We regularly integrate technology into our theology classes," added Hunyor. "We try to use things that will be relatable and engaging to the students when teaching concepts. For example,

when teaching a unit on the 5th commandment, I had my students come up with a concept for a video game that would show respect for life. Projects will often involve podcasts or videos or integrate programs such as Word Art.

"The goal is for our students to be able to transfer the teaching of the Church to real life. To show that they have mastered concepts, we will frequently integrate film, literature, and music, and ask the students to make connections from the content. I just finished a unit on the 4th Commandment, and as a closing activity the students viewed the movie Cinderella Man and wrote a paper making connections between the content and the movie. It is so beautiful to see them light up when they can make the connections!"

Our theology department consists of people who know the faith and live the faith. Our teachers serve the Church and world through ministry positions at their parishes, serving on advisory councils to their pastors, and running service projects at local parishes and the greater community. Central Catholic hopes to teach our students about the faith, and motivate them to go out and live what they have been taught!

And the seniors attend the Kairos retreat, which means "God's Time."

All Central Catholic students are required to complete hours in direct service, leadership, and/or justice awareness and advocacy. They can complete their service in the classroom with teachers, on the court or field with coaches, in small mentorship groups, and inside or outside of school.

Fame in April. She was a pioneer for girls' basketball Hall of Fame in April. She was a pioneer for girls' basketball across the state, opening the door for other women to coach in northwest Ohio. She had a 140-25 record as the first female coach at Central Catholic, including eight Toledo City League titles, two sectional titles, two district championships, one regional championship, and one state final four appearance during her tenure from 1969-80. She also coached tennis, volleyball, and cheerleading at CCHS and served as a guidance counselor, working for a total of 42 years at her alma mater. In 1987, Fran was the first woman to be inducted into the Central Catholic Athletic Hall of Fame. She is also a member of the City League Hall of Fame, the Birmingham Hall of Fame, and the District 7 Basketball Hall of Fame.



"I am excited to be a mentor to young girls and women that are interested in a career in public safety or the fire service," she said. "Specifically because I think that it helps when they see somebody like them in those positions." Pricka Haney '98 was inducted into the Ohio Basketball Hall of Fame in April. Ericka is the girls' basketball head coach at Central Catholic. She led the Lady Irish program to the state tournament semifinals as a player in 1998. Ericka served as Director of Player Development at the Ohio State University before returning to her alma mater. At Central Catholic, she was named First Team All-State twice, and was named Honorable Mention All-American by USA Today and Street & Smith's. Her 1,353 career points and 1,124 career rebounds are both school records. She also led the Lady Irish



Barbara (Krall) Mayer 1950 & Dr. James Mayer 1949





Tn December, Central Catholic received a letter from **Barbara** (Krall) Mayer '50 and her husband, Dr. James Mayer '49, along with a \$200 donation to the Annual Fund. In the letter, Barbara indicated that she felt the need to give back to Central Catholic High School for helping her decide on her career and giving her a great start to her success. She gave us permission to share her letter here:

"In June of 1946, I graduated from St. Louis grade school. I thought I was headed to Waite High School just a few blocks from our home. My mom and dad with six children felt they could not afford Central at \$50 a year. That is when Fr. Ignatius Kelly (pastor of St. Louis) and Fr.

Harrington (principal of Central) thought I should go to Central Catholic. At that time, I was studying voice and thought I was a good prospect for the Glee Club. They offered me a \$200 scholarship for four years. Of course I was thrilled, excited, and accepted the offer!

"I was fortunate enough my sophomore year to get the sub-lead in The Firefly, my junior year the lead in *The Chimes of Normandy*, and my senior year, the part of Sylvia, in Sweethearts. I feel the need to thank Central Catholic again, and at least pay back the \$200. In today's world, that would pay back about two days of school! But it gave me a chance to decide on a career to pursue.

"In 1952, morning TV opened up for viewing.

Until then, it didn't go on the air until noon. I spent over five years with WSPD TV Channel 13 in Toledo, from 1952 to August of 1956. In 1956, I was married to James Mayer, a Centralite from 1949, who was a student at OSU dental school. I spent two years at WBNS TV, singing and doing commercial work.

"Thank you Central Catholic for giving me a great start, doing what I loved!"

When we contacted
Barbara about sharing
her letter, she explained
that even though it has
been many years since
her Central Catholic
experience, she never
forgot how much it meant
to her. She always planned
to pay back what she was
given, and hopefully make
a difference to a student
today.

Charles A. Sullivan Class of 1953

1935-2021 Charles A. Sullivan will be remembered for his philanthropic spirit. He and his wife, Jackie, were responsible for the major, lead gift to build the stateof-the-art Sullivan Center at Central Catholic that is used for school Masses and

activities, athletic contests,

and community events.

What fewer people realize is how much Mr. Sullivan supported Central Catholic students academically. For over 20 years, the Sullivan Scholarship Fund has helped top students to attend Central Catholic High School. Mr. Sullivan created the scholarship in honor of his parents, Arthur and Eleanor Sullivan, as

a way to continue the academic excellence that is a tradition at Central Catholic.

Chuck began his career in the financial sector of Price Waterhouse and quickly rose within its ranks. He President of Seven-Up in Indiana and later served as President of Canada Dry-New England. He was recruited to join American Bakeries and four years later he was made President of all American Bakeries operations.

Chuck later became CEO and then Chairman of Interstate Bakeries Corporation, which he took public. During his tenure, Interstate Bakeries (Wonder Bread and Hostess Cake) was listed on the Fortune 500 and became the largest baking company in the United States.

He is survived by his wife, Jacqueline; his four sons, two daughters, and two step-sons, and a greatgranddaughter.
